## MONTAUK

I'm still feeling a thrill after seeing 19-year-old classical pianist Drew Petersen perform pieces by Beethoven, Chopin and Samuel Barber on Saturday evening at a concert sponsored by the Friends of the Montauk Library. Though I hinted I'd like company for this extraordinary event, my friends are inundated with hectic summer schedules, including my husband, Don. I hastened on foot to the library. Summer traffic is scary for pedestrians. For the last leg I walked on the wrong side of the road, which seemed safer than crossing Montauk Highway twice in drifting fog.

I had the pleasure of sitting with Edna Steck at the concert. She entertained me by describing how as a young bride, new to Montauk, she prepared lobster salad for Montauk Community Church summer dinners. Both of us not being tall, we took seats near the aisle. The Suzanne Koch Gosman room filled to about 85 people. I regret we didn't take seats on the left where we would have been better able to see Mr. Petersen's miraculous fingers effortlessly fly, so it seemed, up and down the keys.

I've been exposed to classical piano via recordings and been to a few piano concerts, both at the library and at Community Church. Yet seeing Mr. Petersen was a revelation. The most incredible part is Mr. Petersen is only 19. A tall, dark haired handsome fellow with an intense presence, he didn't speak a word until the performance ended. Afterward, he submitted to a question-and-answer session. A woman asked how he gets to that "other place" where he seems to be while performing. He said he's in no such other place. During performances he must focus more in the present than at any other times in his life, and this takes tremendous mental preparation and concentration, according to Mr. Petersen.

the performed roughly one and a half hours of complex compositions without printed music. It seemed to both Ms. Steck and me that at times his eyes were almost or completely closed as he played. It's not often one has the chance to witness true genius.
